1900 Study Club Hears Mrs. R. D. Poindexter

Mrs. Taylor Cowan Jr., was hostess last Monday afternoon to the members of the 1900 Study Club at her lovely home on Holston Drive. A social hour preceded the meeting when a desert plate with coffee was served by Mrs. Cowan and Mrs. James McDaniel.

Mrs. M. G. Hamrick, program leader, presented Mrs. R. D. Poindexter who gave an excellent book review. The chosen topic was "religion" and Mrs. Poindexter reviewed the book "Family Living In The Bible," by Edith Deen and used as her theme, "Household of Faith Sustained."

The author had executed a wonderful research for this book and it was really her thesis for her master's degree. She has also received much praise from other outstanding writers, including Faith Baldwin.

Mrs. Poindexter opened her talk by saying that "Families Of Faith" spoken of in the Bible are there for a reason; they are the salvation of mankind. She told of the Hebrew family relationship and said that in every one of the 56 books there is mention of family living. In Biblical days, the husband had much to say about rearing children. Families included relatives

and friends and they united with God in leading the way.

The 11th chapter of Hebrew was quoted as proof of faith and how it becomes stronger. The development of inner resources provided for increase in faith; faith is the result of sustaining contentment. Mrs. Poindexter recalled how Abraham and Jacob lived more on faith and the promises.

She told how the author of "Nearer My God," Sarah F. Adams, wrote the hymn despite her suffering.

The speaker recalled how God prepares his leaders, mentioning Aaron, Pharoah, Paul and men in modern times as well; He calls them and changes them. Mrs. Poindexter mentioned Peter Marshall and how he "ties in with our generation."

In closing, the speaker said "Home is Heaven, choose this day whom you will serve" — this is the challenge for today.

Mrs. Faucette Speaks

Mrs. Faucette had as her topic, Christiana Tsai, author of "Queen of the Dark Chamber," a Chinese woman who has been converted to Christianity, and who has been bedridden for

many years with an oriental disease. She lives at Leaman Place, a 200-year-old home in Paradise, Pa., and carries on in daily living in such a joyous way.

Mrs. Faucette had the pleasure of meeting Christiana when she attended a service of baptism and Holy Communion Nov. 1, with Mrs. Louisa Faucette Bachman at Leaman Place.

The service was for four Chinese soldiers who had been converted to Christianity. The scripture was from Acts 8:26-40 and the message, "Placed Under a New Commander." These men were from Formosa and while stationed at Aberdeen, Md., were under the influence of Christiana Tsai.

Miss Tsai, with Miss Mary Leaman and Miss Lucy Leaman, have been instrumental in leading many Chinese soldiers to Christianity and they in turn have led others upon their return to China. These dedicated women have also translated the Bible into Chinese and have been most successful in their work.

"The Queen of the Dark Chamber" is the story of Christiana Tsai's life as told to Ellen L. Drummond and dedicated to Christiana's godmother, Miss Mary A. Leaman.

Mrs. Faucette also brought an unusual bell which tingled beloved Christmas carols.

The program was concluded with group singing of Christmas carols, led by Mrs. William Hopson with Mrs. Van Pelt as pianist.

A social hour preceded the program.

Mrs. VanPelt's home was festive with lighted Christmas candles and Christmas greens attractively arranged on the mantel, piano and small tables.

The dining table, overlaid with a handsome white embroidered cloth, held an unusual arrangement of green maline on a round silver tray with lighted pale green bayberry candles in graduated sizes. 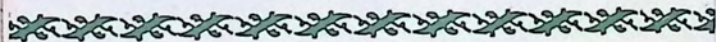

George Warren Speaks For 1900 Literary Club

The ballroom of the Bristol Country Club was transformed into a mock political convention hall recently when Mrs. Jules Smythe and Mrs. Bill King were hostesses to the 1900 Literary Club.

More than 50 members and their husbands attended the dinner meeting. Behind the head table was a backdrop of red, white and blue draped flannel with posters imploring members to vote.

On the head table was a centerpiece of graduating red, white and blue candles flanked by the mascots of the two major parties, an elephant and donkey representing the Republican and Democratic parties respectively. A red streamer ran down the center of each table.

Mrs. Albert Cooper Jr., president, opened the meeting and introduced Mr. John Ed Faucette who gave the invocation.

Following the dinner Mrs. Cooper introduced and welcomed two new members: Mrs. Charles Bledsoe and Mrs. R. D. Godsey Jr.

Mr. Cooper then introduced the speaker, Senator George M. Warren Jr., representing the 15th Senatorial District of Virginia, who gave a most interesting and educational look at the Democrats.

Senator Warren outlined the origin of the Democratic Party, stating that this party was first known as the Democratic Republican Party. This is the group that elected Thomas Jefferson president.

From the beginning the Democratic Party has been the one to cater to the common people — farmers, white collar workers and laborers.

Senator Warren continued his review of the Democratic Party to the time of the rise of the Republican Party, known as the Grand Old Party, in the late 19th century.

Senator Warren continued with a comparison of the two major parties emphasizing that the Democrats have been responsible for the stabilization of currency, the breaking up of monopolies, Social Security, federal depositories, TVA, the recognition of labor unions, to mention a few.

Sen. Warren concluded with the statement that each person must decide, after serious study, for himself what he feels is right on political issues and then vote according to his convictions.

He mentioned Tom Driver, formerly of Bristol, now in New York, as "a Christian who is on the right track."

In conclusion he said art reveals us to ourselves. A spirited discussion followed Dr. Smythe's talk during the social hour. Mrs. Faucette showed an interesting picture, a wedding gift from Dr. Smythe's parents.

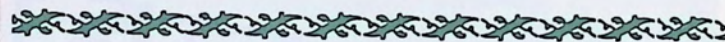

The Boone family was wealthy and also conservative. Daniel Boone did not discover Kentucky but he was the first to explore it thoroughly. He arranged the Transylvania purchase, cut the Wilderness Road across the mountains to Cumberland Gap and toured the country from Pennsylvania, to the Shenandoah Valley, Virginia, North Carolina, East Tennessee and Southwest Virginia.

Daniel was a hunter, at home in the forest, but he was also a land speculator, a militia officer, a surveyor, an administrator, a legislator and a friend of men with wealth and social position. He was also a master of himself. He died at the age of 89 in Missouri. He was a tall lean man but a master of the wilderness.

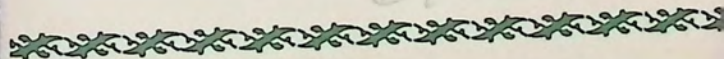

In closing the speaker compared the prices with those of today. The Victorian pieces ranged from \$12 to \$20 and the castor sets were \$15 and \$25. A five-piece tea service, needing resilvering, cost about \$45.

Stephen Foster had a great love for the South and for the southern way of life. He heard the spirituals in a negro church in Kentucky and that is where he gained his love for these songs. His most famous song is "My Old Kentucky Home." His last song was "Beautiful Dreamer," still used today. He went to New York a short time before his death, to be near his publisher. He died tragically at the age of 37.

"Dixie," by Daniel Emmert, "Bonnie Blue Flag," and "Lorena," were some of the still popular songs Mrs. Hopson discussed.

The majority of the deaf, the speaker said, communicate by the use of the sign language and this continues to be the most fluent means of communication.

Mrs. Treadwell said Spain was the first country to help the deaf and Dr. Thomas Galladuet who accomplished much of the work in England and Paris founded the first school for the deaf in the United States in Hartford, Conn. The Galladuet University in Washington, D. C., was established later and is run by the federal government. There

are schools for the deaf in most states and Tennessee and Virginia have one in Knoxville and Staunton.

The average deaf person has a limited knowledge of English words. Some signs for the deaf are easy to learn and some are not, the speaker explained. She demonstrated many of the signs and said the deaf write the same way they "talk" and they are pretty much literal minded. One must know your subject in order to give the correct meaning of words.

In speaking of the special ministry for the deaf, the speaker asked who is to proclaim the gospel to them? "We who know God must share our knowledge with them as a teacher and friend." The deaf are patient and dedicated, she said.

Mrs. Treadwell closed her talk with scripture from Romans and with a recording interpreted the Lord's Prayer in the sign language.

Mrs. S. T. Bowman, chairman of the program committee, presented the new year books. Members of her committee are Mrs. Paul Cowan and Mrs. C. C. Hamlett.

The Cherokee Indians, she said, are warmhearted and tolerant people and are interested in the outside world though they live on reservations and are able to provide their own economics by their knowledge growing vegetables and the use of nature's products in cooking. They have a shy hospitality and soft voices. Many of them carry transistor radios everywhere they go and they love music.

Mrs. Caldwell showed the unfinished weasel made of cherry given her by Miss Amanda Crowe, Cherokee Indian, who teaches wood carving in the schools of Cherokee, N.C.

In conclusion she said "she hoped the Indians would overcome their justified bitterness toward the white people for the cruel treatment of their ancestors in the past who were driven from their beautiful mountain habitats."

The club will have its Christmas meeting Dec. 9 with Mrs. Ramsey Faucette, hostess, and Miss Margaret Mitchell program leader.

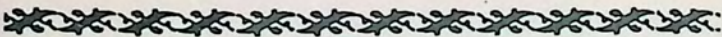

Prefacing her remarks on the personal life of the former president of the United States, Mrs. Cowan stated the writer of the book, a reporter, spent five years of painstaking research before putting a word on paper.

He considered Mr. Hoover a great president, but before his four years as president were over, he was one of the most hated presidents.

Mr. Hoover was born in 1874, in West Branch, Iowa, of poor Quaker parents who died when their three children were very young. They were farmed out for very little money. Mr. Hoover was partially self supporting by the time he was nine years old and from then on progressed in his work and studies. When he was 16, he was admitted to Sanford University where he became an important man on the campus and he did very well in his studies, especially in mathematics. However he was always aloof from his fellow students. The speaker told how he progressed in his work in the mines. His wife, whom he met in college was a geology major and the only woman he ever noticed. He moved on to Colorado and Mexico where he loved mining gold and zinc. From there he went to China at the age of 23 and cabled "Miss" Lou to marry him. They were married the next day.

From China he was sent to Shanghai and London and at the age of 27 was the richest mining engineer in the world. The couple's two sons were born while in London and his fortune continued to grow. Mr. Hoover was at ease with his sons, but never with outsiders. He was the highest paid man in the world and at the age of 40 was worth 10 million dollars.

In 1914, when World War I started, he became interested in public service in Europe and using his own money saved literally thousands from starving. He was highly honored and respected but would never accept decorations, working without pay.

From Europe he went to California and from there to Washington where he became more interested in public service, serving as secretary of commerce under President Harding along with Andrew Mellon, who was secretary - treasurer.

Mr. Hoover was not interested in being president when his name was presented as his son had died at 16 and he was more silent than ever. At 54 he ran against Al Smith and won—this was an American dream come true and the greatest victory in American history.

When Mr. and Mrs. Hoover went to the White House the White House was updated and there was much entertaining which he paid for out of his own pocket. His hair turned white in the four years he was there. Though invited he never visited the White House during Franklin D. Roosevelt's regime. When offered an appointment by Harry Truman, this added ten years to his life.

Mr. Hoover died at the age of 90 and was buried in West Branch, Iowa.

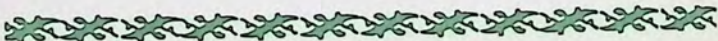

Miss Margaret Mitchell Reports To Study Club

Miss Margaret Mitchell gave an interesting program on "Antique Glass" at the January meeting Monday afternoon of the 1900 Study Club when club members were guests of Miss Reva Gilmer, Highland Avenue.

Miss Mitchell discussed the subject under the headings of looking glass, cut glass, pressed glass, hand blown glass and art glass.

She described numerous objects made of the various techniques. As she talked on the various subjects she had some on display and also pictures of her topics.

The speaker stated that glass for mirrors was so scarce and expensive until 1840 that only small pieces could be used for mirrors.

In speaking of cut glass of the brilliant period, 1870-1900, she said it should be cared for carefully "for we shall not see its like again."

Pressed glass, although introduced in 1820 as an inexpensive substitute for cut glass, is by no means to be scorned. Glass bottles, the speaker said, were produced in early unsuccessful glass factories in America but it was not until 1840 that the demand became great. Collectors now are happy with bottles made between 1840-1900.

Glass cups with saucers were popular in England and America in the early 19th century, Miss Mitchell stated and pressed glass cup plates were very popular in this country starting in 1830.

Miss Mitchell said all art glass was colorful and is divided into four classes: cased or overlaid glass, metallic glass, painted glass and iridescent glass.

A brief business session was conducted by Mrs. William H. Hopson, president, who presided. She welcomed the group and asked Mrs. C. Gibson to lead the Club Collect.

A dessert plate with hot tea and mints was served during the social hour.

The flowers bloom in March and April.

An interesting scene shown was a miniature replica of a Dutch town with a castle. Flowers are

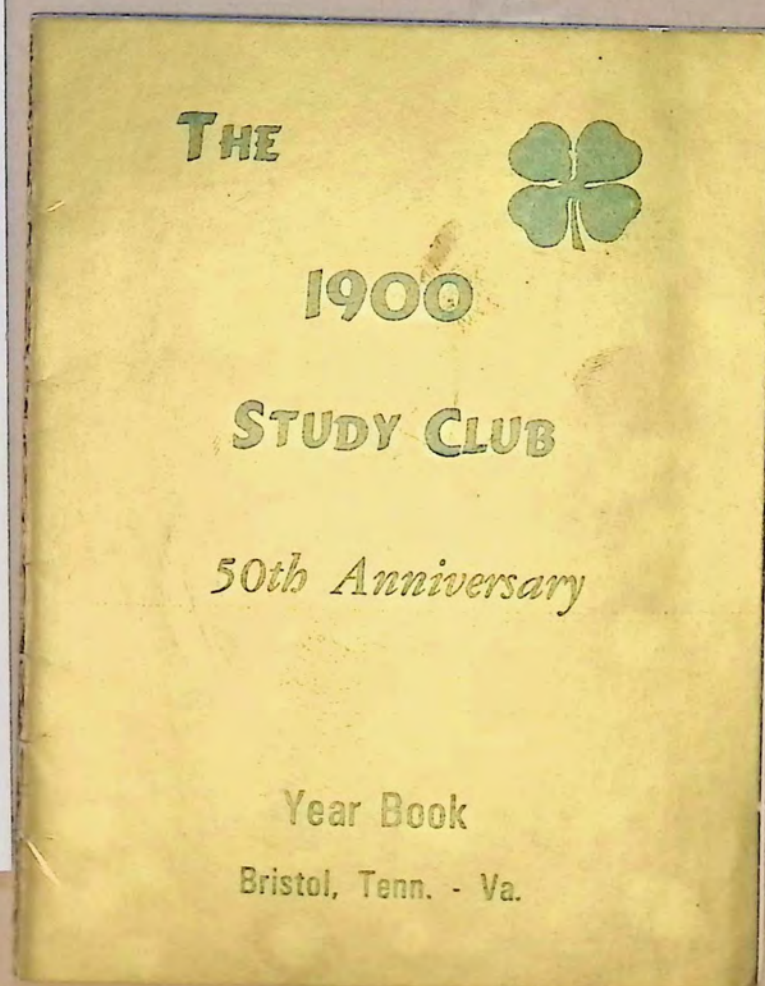

The main objective of the 1900 Study Club

has always been to study for self improvement. The programs at monthly meetings in the homes of members consist of, current events, literature, art and music. During the years of membership in the Tennessee Federation, the club cooperated with state and national projects. Since its withdrawal from the Federation in 1947, the club has concentrated its contributions to a King College scholarship and the Bristol Public Library.
