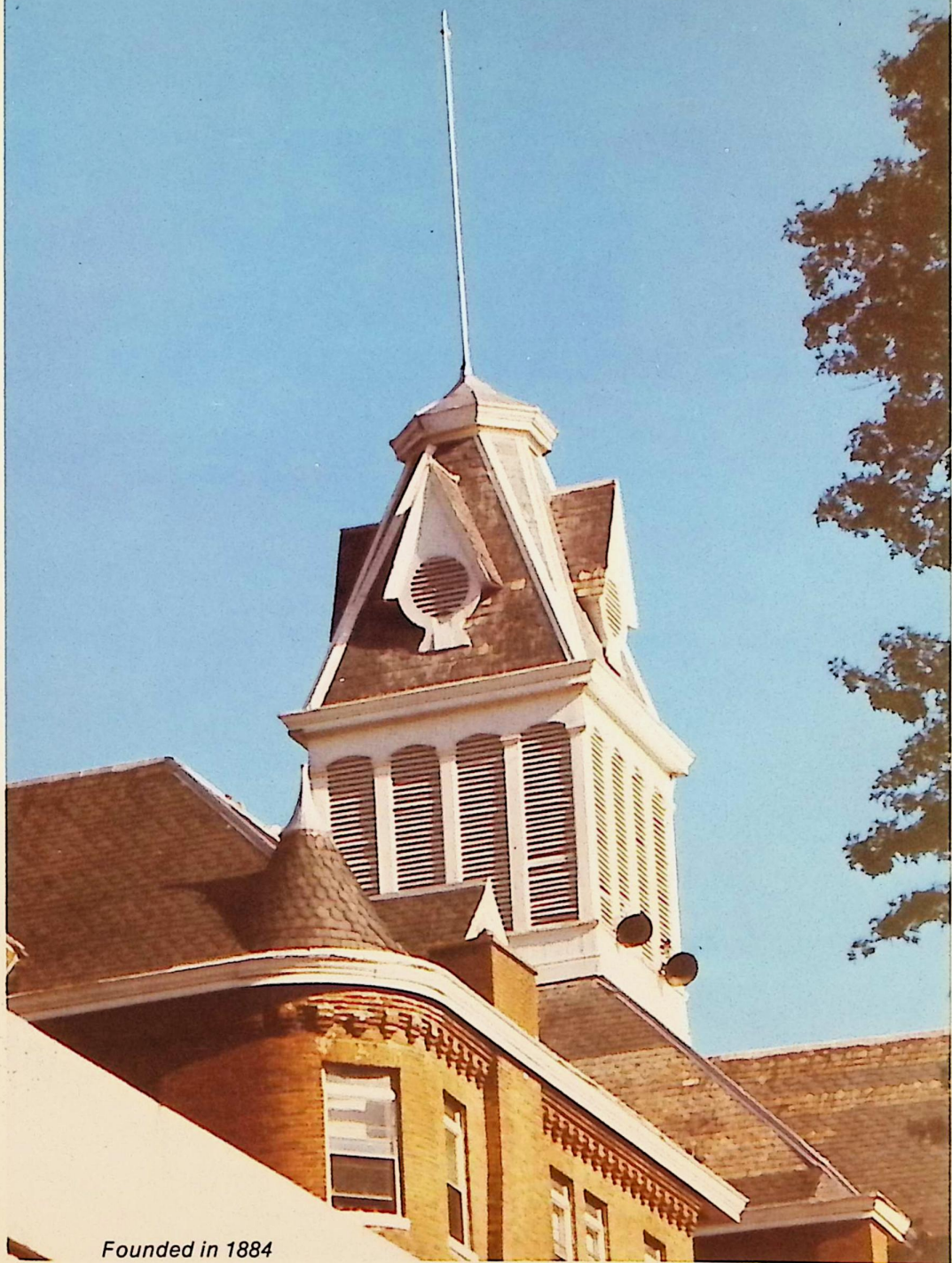
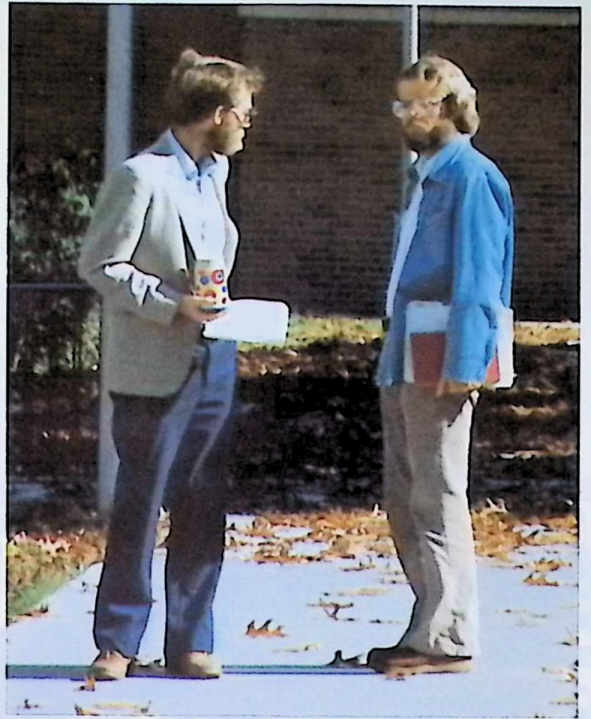
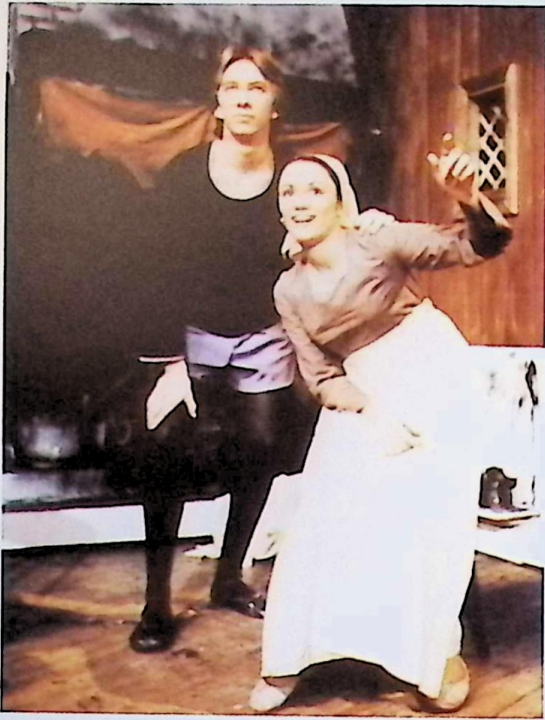

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## *V.I. is Virginia Intermont*

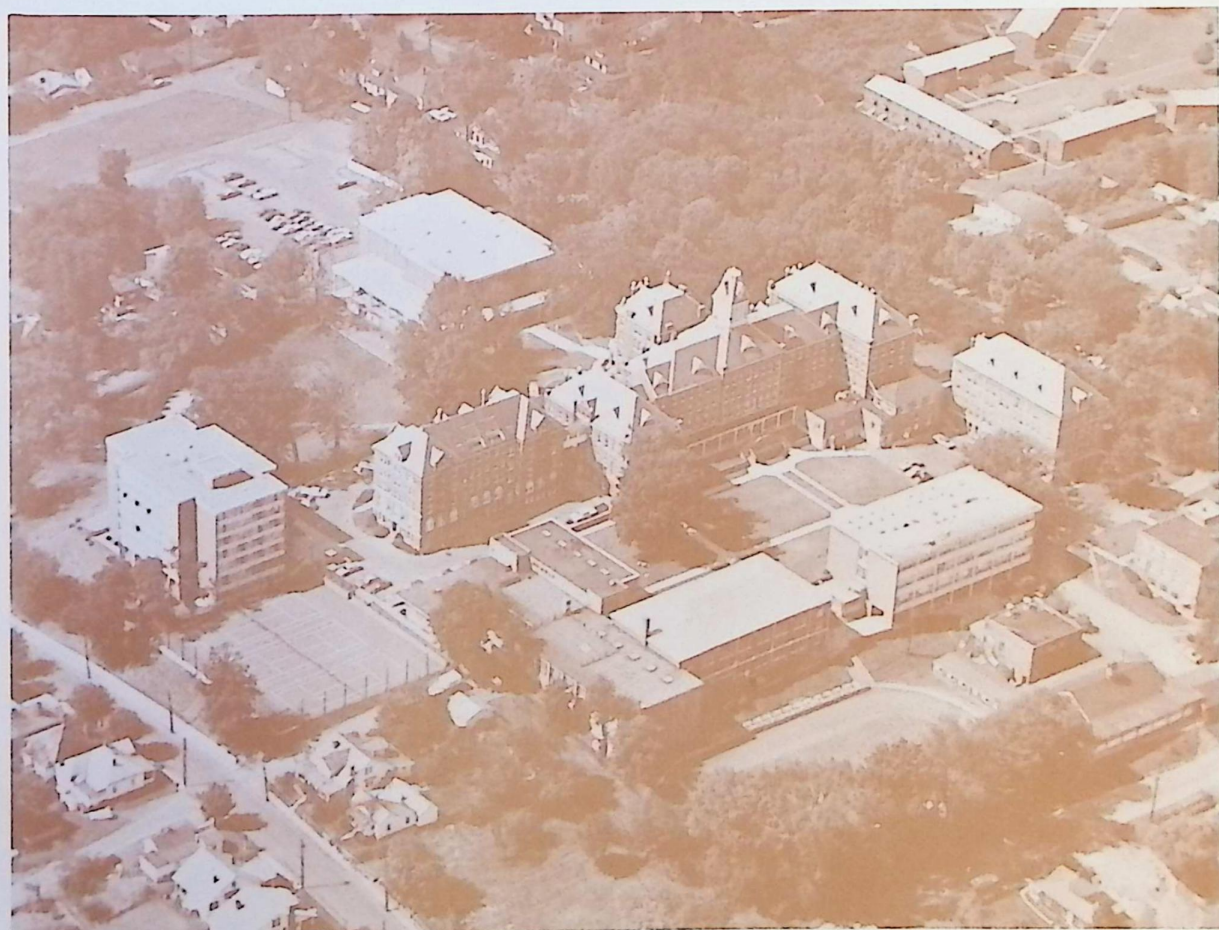
Virginia Intermont is a fully-accredited, private, four-year, residential, co-educational college founded in 1884. It is located in Bristol, Virginia, midway between Roanoke, Virginia and Knoxville, Tennessee.

V.I. is a small college with about 650 students, who come from 35 states and several foreign countries.

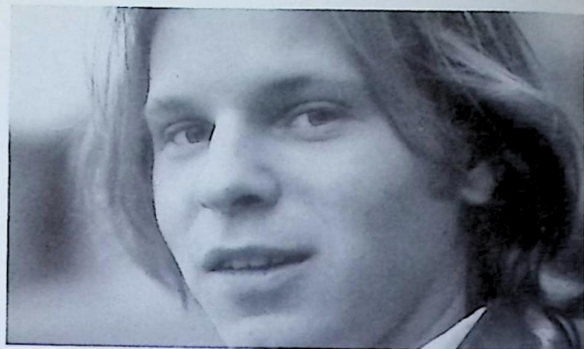
V.I. is a private college affiliated with the Baptist General Association of Virginia; however, it serves students of all faiths. More than 20 religious denominations are represented in the student body.

V.I. emphasizes the importance of personalizing education through close relationships among students, faculty, and staff. The student-faculty ratio is 13 to 1.

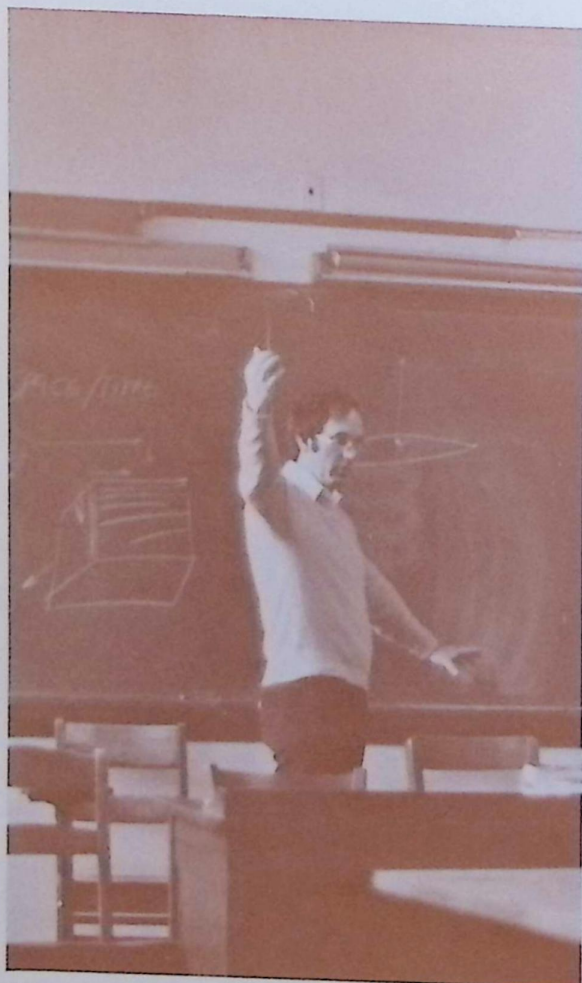
V.I. offers courses in 25 fields of study. All four-year degree programs are built on a foundation of general education courses, but V.I. offers many opportunities for a professional education. Many students are enrolled in programs which offer definite career opportunities. An important feature of several majors is a senior off-campus professional internship.

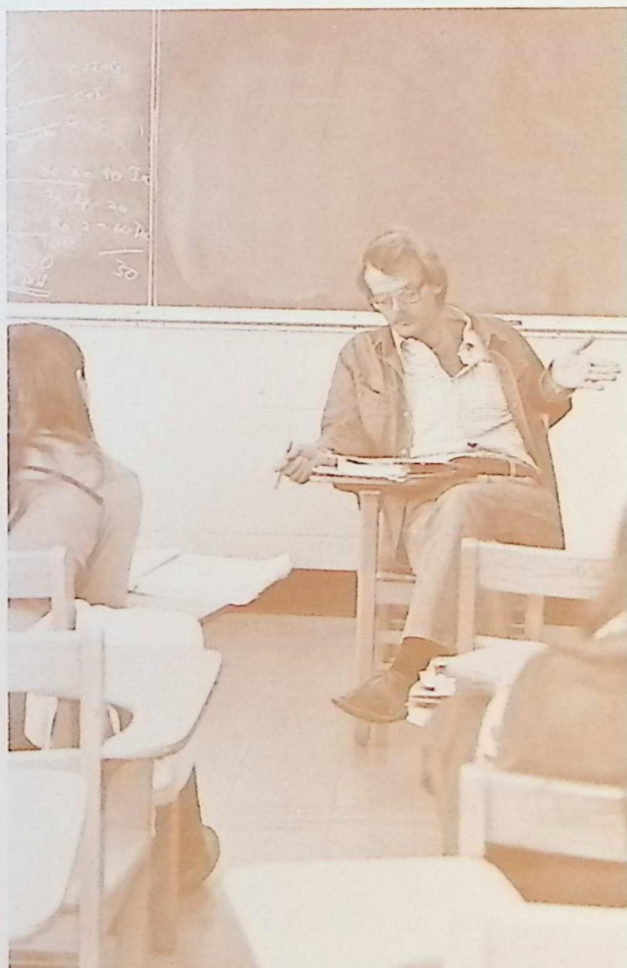
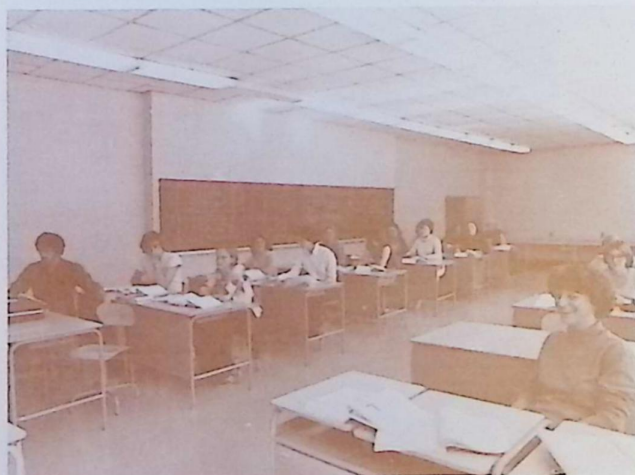
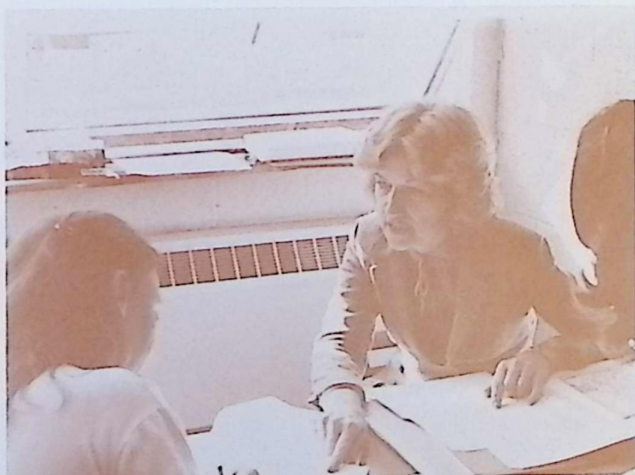
## *V.I. is Programs*

V.I. offers four-year programs leading to the B.A. degree and two-year programs leading to the A.A. degree. Students working toward a B.A. degree have several options: (1) They can choose a major with a concentration of courses in one field of study, (2) they may combine the requirements of two fields into a double major, or (3) they may plan an individualized major by combining various areas of study. For example, V.I. students are taking such double majors as horsemanship and management, physical education and recreation, English and music, social work and psychology. Individualized majors such as English-journalism-

photography, psychology-sociology-political science, art-music-drama are possible. Within the academic resources of the College, the possible combinations are many and varied.

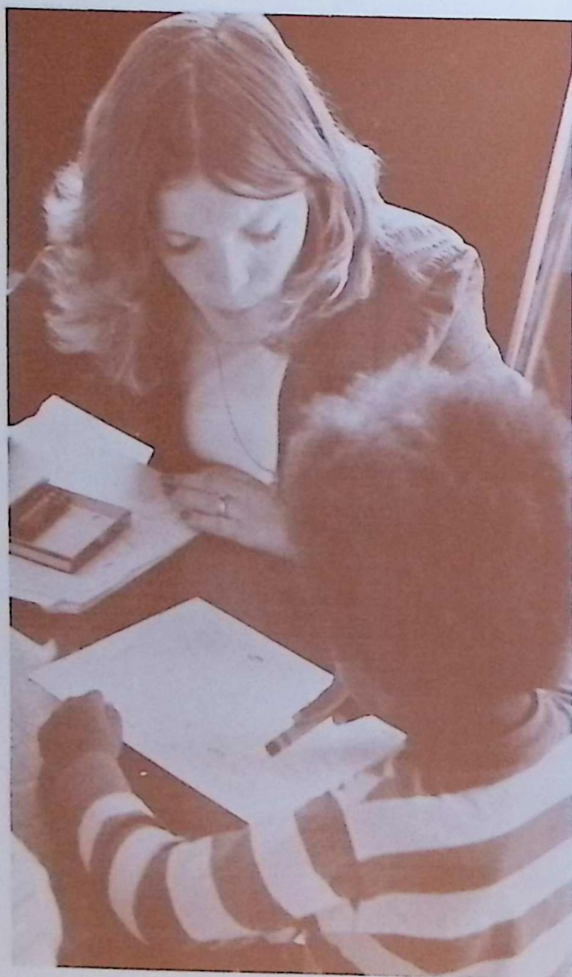
## *V.I. is People*

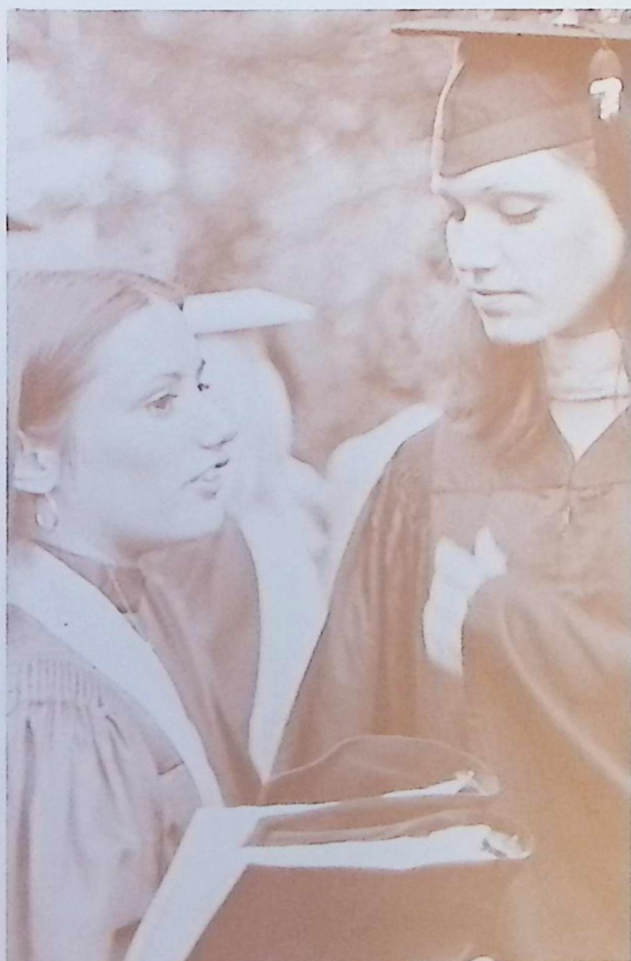


Management, Office Administration, Communications, Recreation, Photography, Social Work, Physical Education, English, and Psychology-Sociology.

The performing outlet for ballet students is the Bristol Ballet Company.

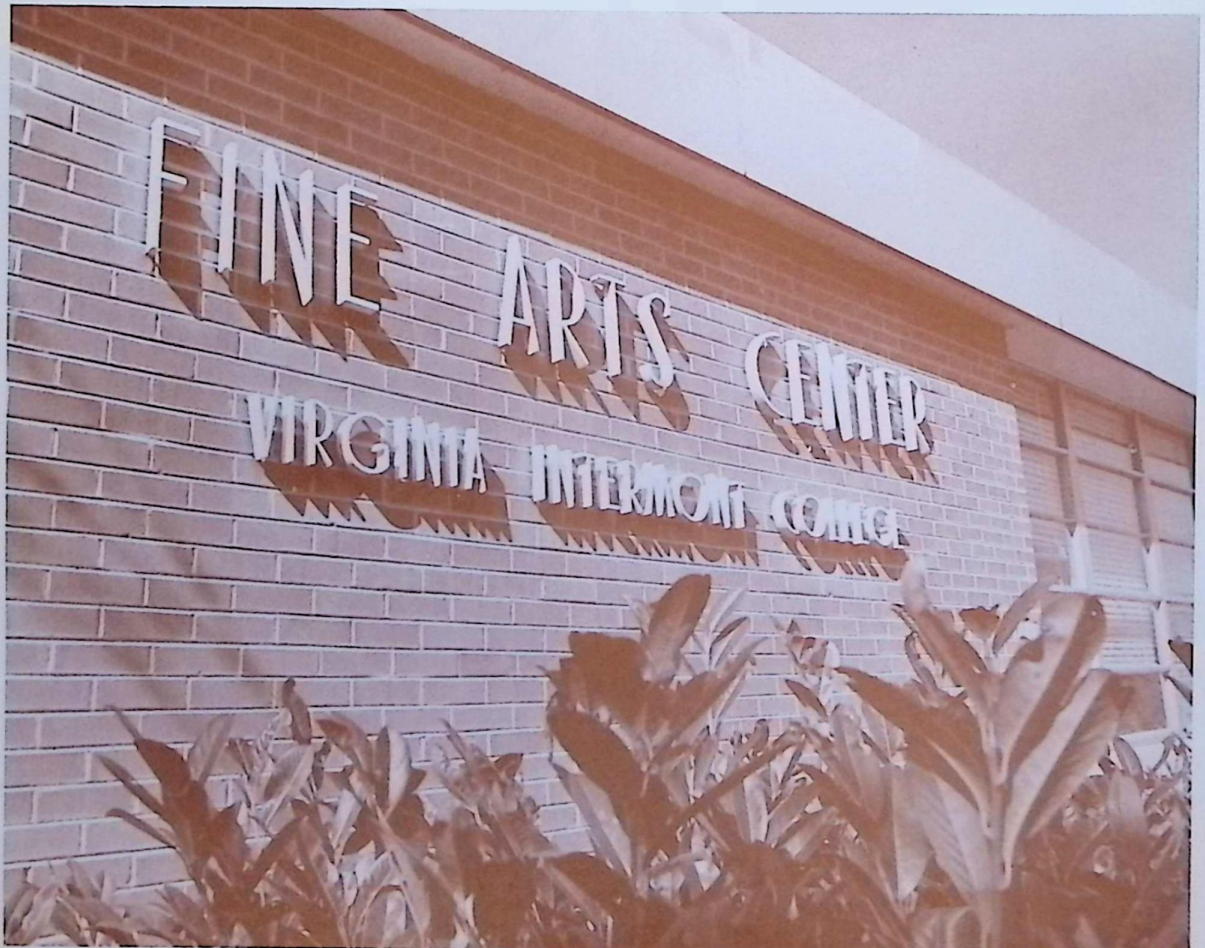


## Cost

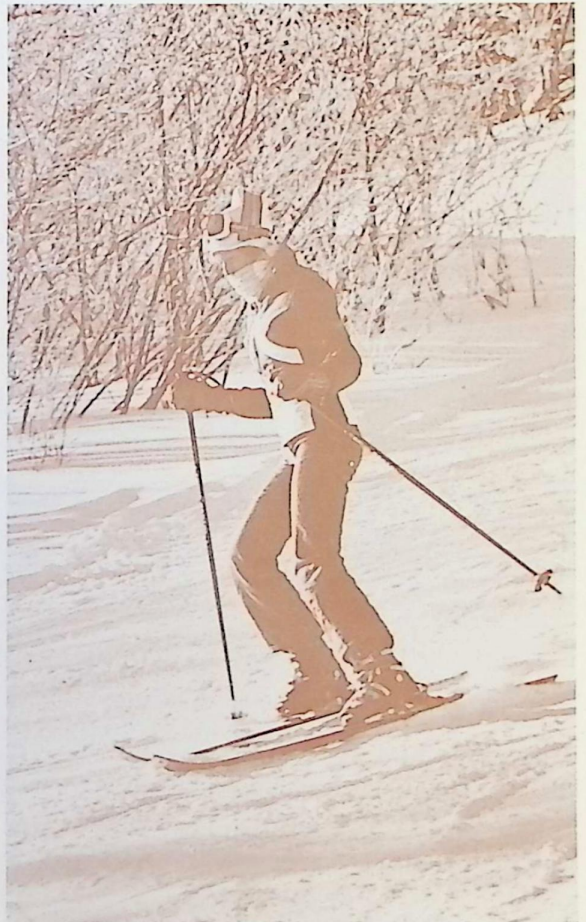
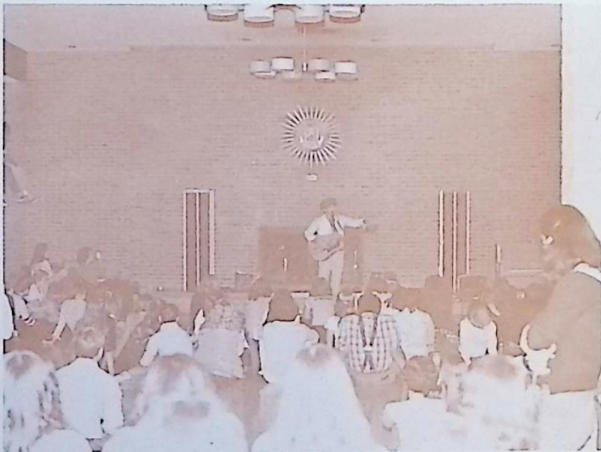




## On and Off Campus

Social activities include mixers, dances, parties, picnics, concerts, receptions, and tours. Trips to other colleges (there are six within a 25-mile radius of Bristol) for concerts, social activities, and athletic events are arranged through the student activities program. Special events such as Senior Weekend, Parents' Weekend, Sweetheart Dance, Christmas Dance, and May Day are highlights of the social calendar.

The Director of Student Activities works with the Student Government's Social Advisory Committee in planning bus trips to nearby points of interest such as Biltmore Estates, Gatlinburg, the

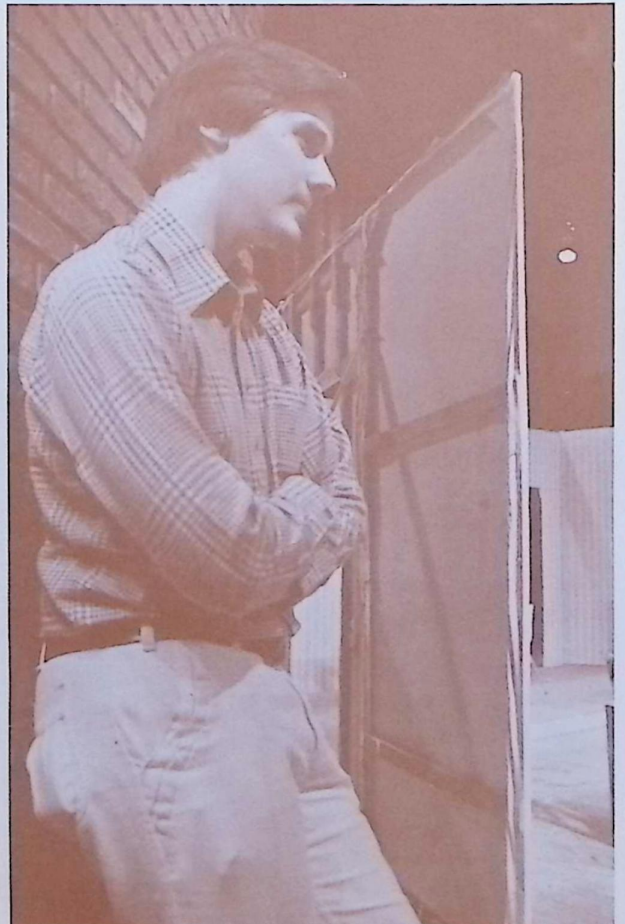
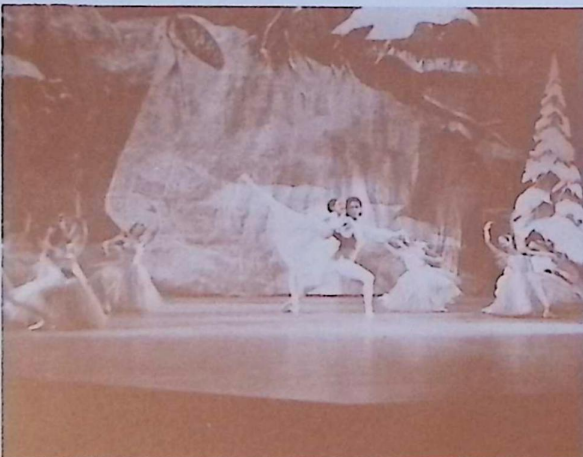


Smoky Mountains, and Carolina ski resorts. Trips are also offered, as the demand warrants, to more distant attractions: New York City, Colonial Williamsburg, Atlanta, New Orleans, the Kentucky Derby, Washington, and Annapolis.

"Intermont" means "among the mountains." The rolling foothills of the Blue Ridge Mountains provide a beautiful panoramic view from the campus. Mountain skiing, hiking, and backpacking resorts (Blowing Rock, Beech



Mountain, Seven Devils, the Appalachian Trail) are within an hour's drive. Asheville, Gatlinburg, Roanoke, and Knoxville are within three hours' drive. Historic Abingdon, Barter Theater, and TVA lakes are only a few minutes away.

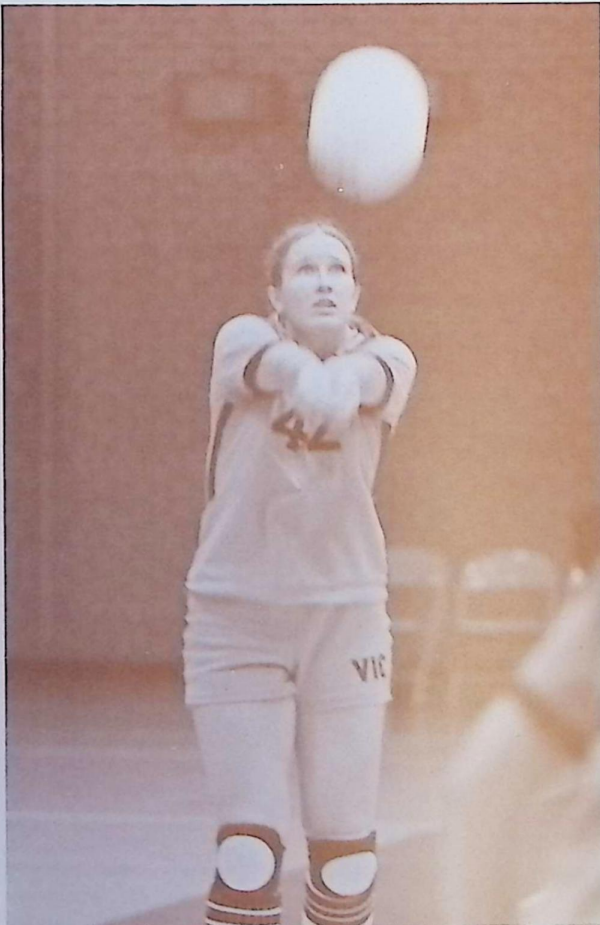

Guest lecturers and artists, faculty members, and students combine their efforts for a full schedule of cultural activities.

## ***Athletics/Recreation***

Recreational facilities for teaching and recreation include a gymnasium, indoor pool, weight room with new Hydra-Gym equipment, lighted tennis courts, and an athletic field. Local facilities are used for golf and bowling. The Riding Center, located on a 129-acre farm, includes stables for 60 horses; 2 large indoor rings; hunter trial course, pre-training and training level cross-country courses,



# Student Living

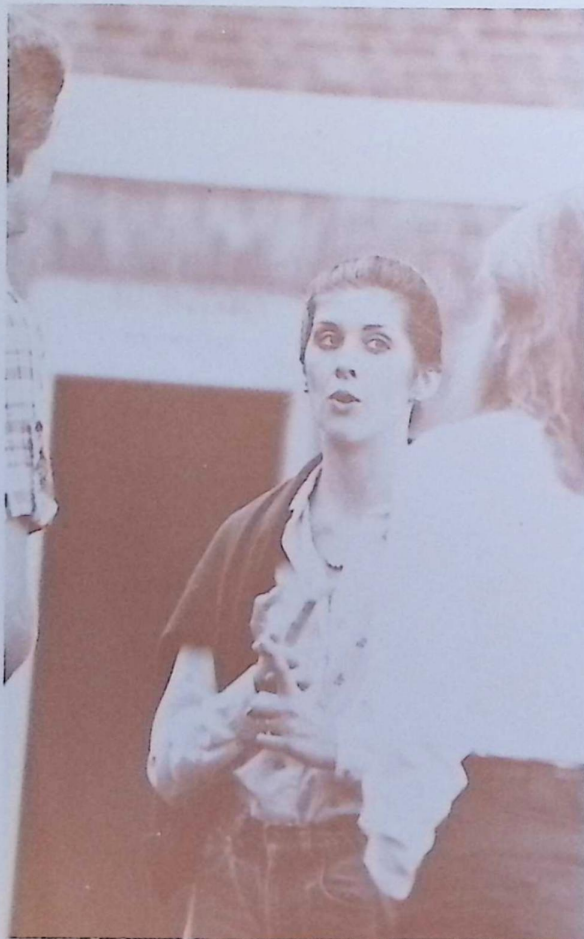
Students from outside the immediate area must live in college housing: five residence units for women and one for men. Married students live in town.

There are both traditional and modern buildings. Most rooms accommodate two students; some singles are available.

House regulations are established through the combined efforts of residents of the unit, Student Council of the Student Government Association, and Campus Life Committee.

Within the framework of a liberal curfew or key permission, students come and go at their discretion. Dates may visit in rooms on Fridays, Saturdays, and Sundays. Students may have cars on

turn-out areas; and demonstration classroom. An active program of intramural and extramural athletics is sponsored by the Athletic Association. 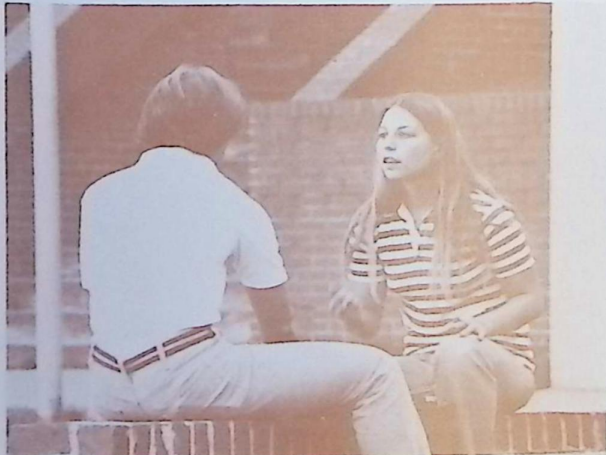
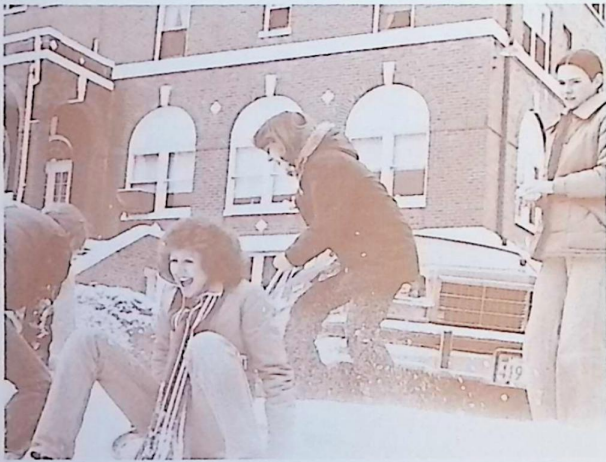
## Student Services

Laundrettes are available on campus and a linen rental service is offered at reasonable cost.

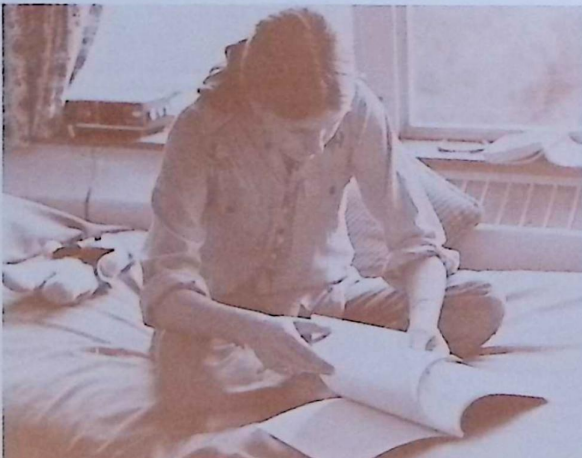
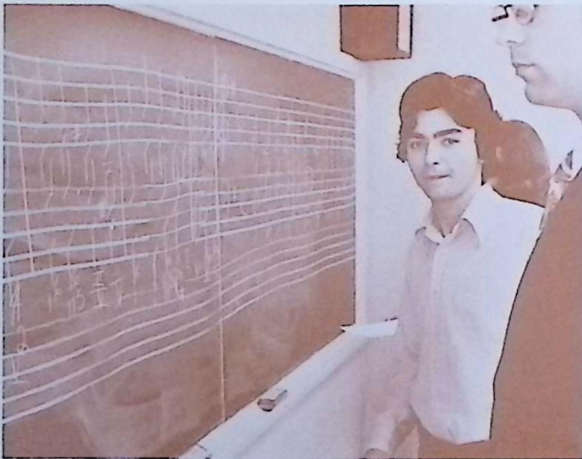
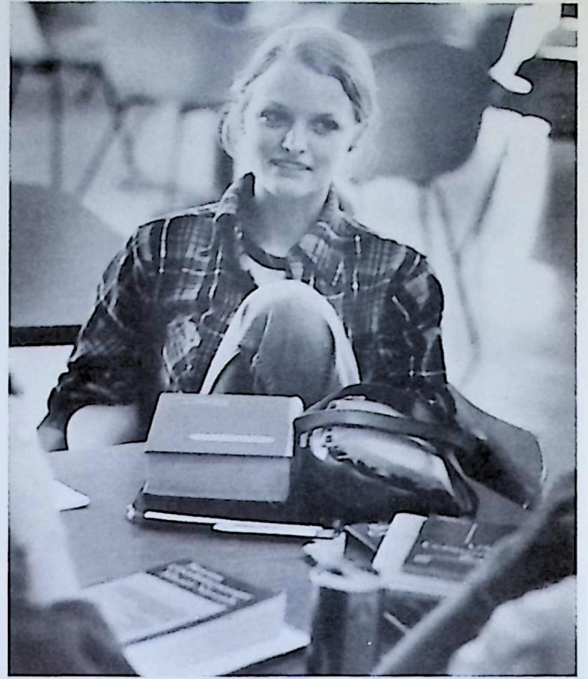

The Bank of Intermont is operated as a depository for students' personal funds.

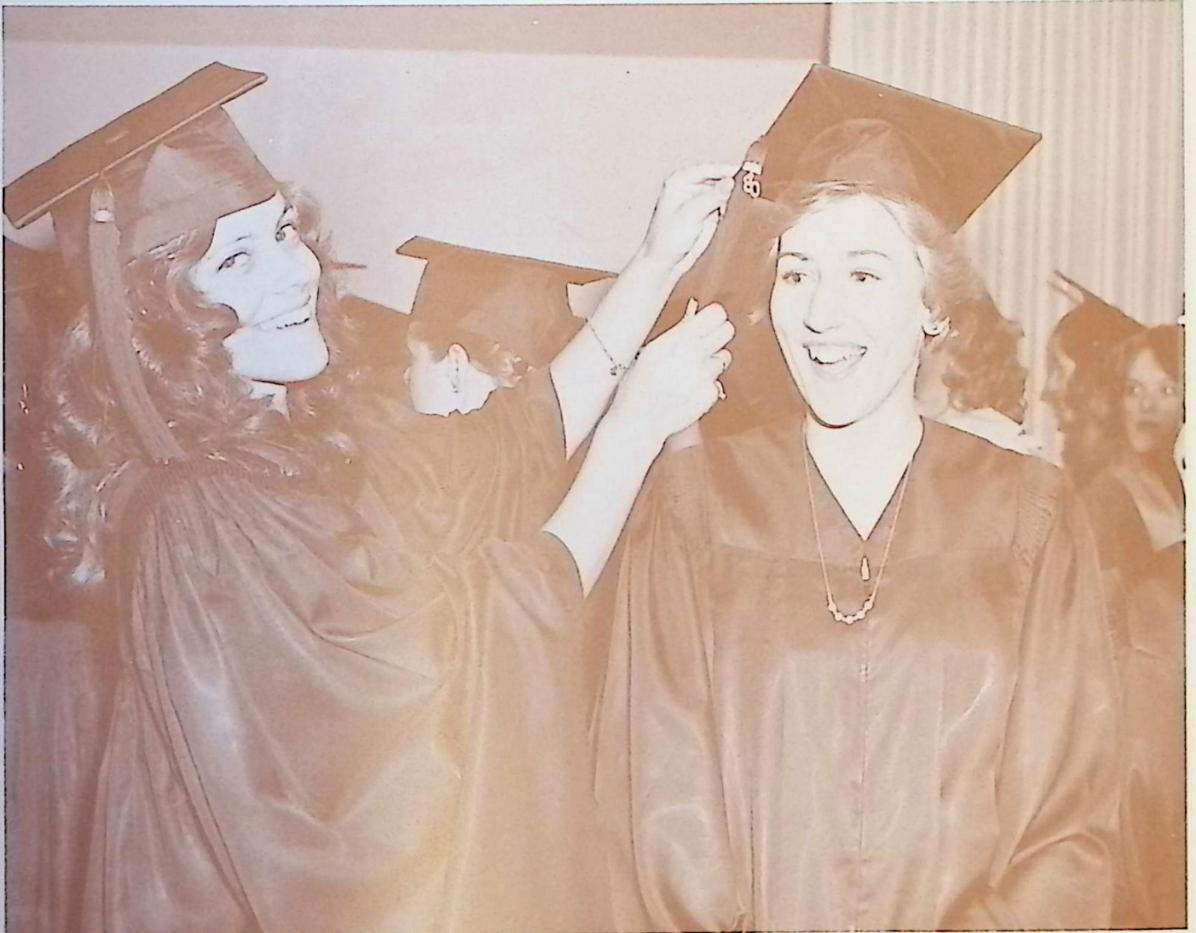




## ***Counseling Services***

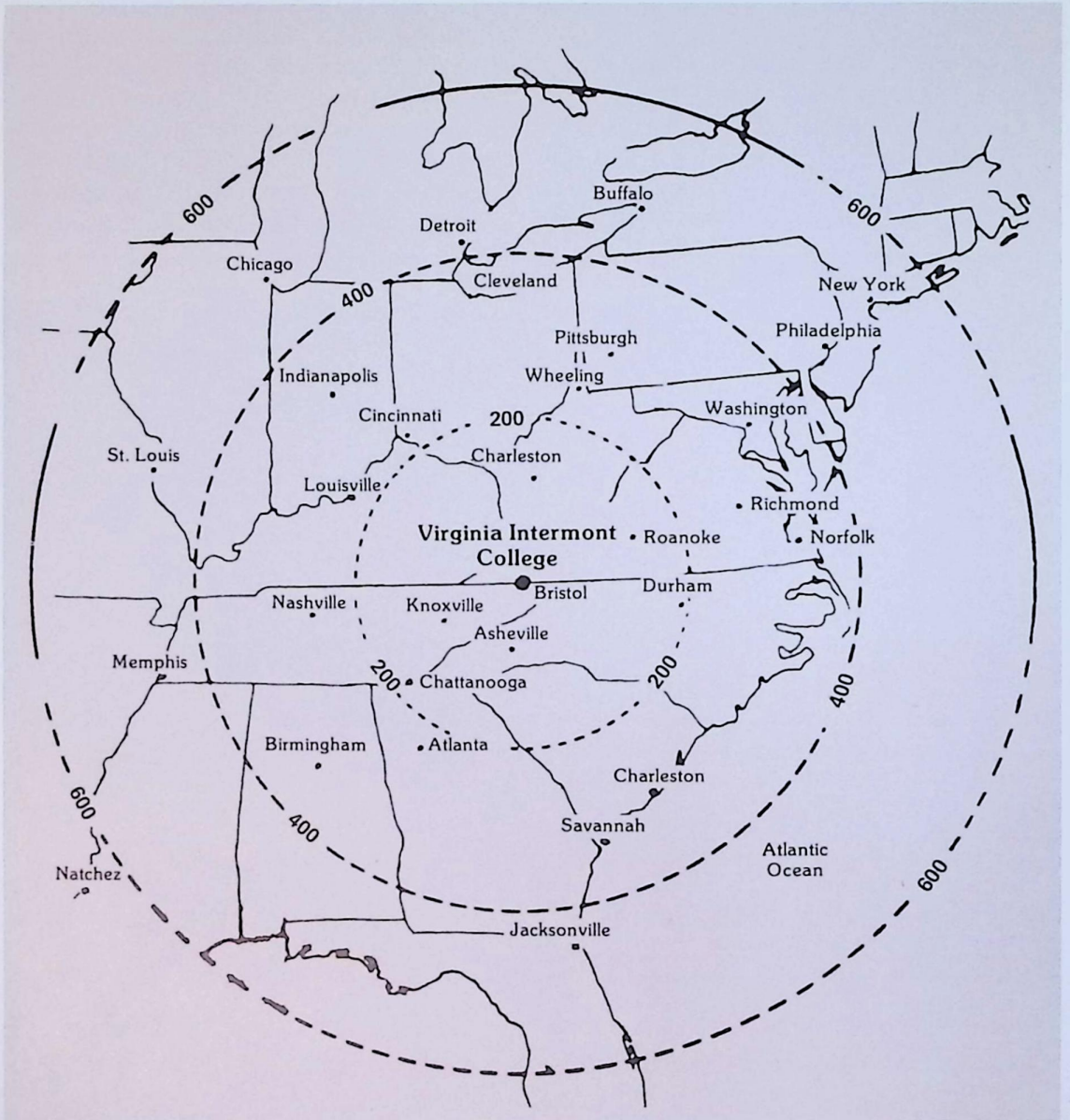

# Location

V.I. is in Bristol, Virginia-Tennessee, a twin city of 45,000. The campus is only eight blocks from downtown. Bristol, Johnson City and Kingsport, Tennessee comprise the Tri-Cities, with an area population of 300,000.

Bristol is on Interstate 81, 140 miles southwest of Roanoke and 100 miles north of Knoxville, Tennessee. Our airport is Tri-Cities, which is serviced by Piedmont, U.S. Air, and Republic Airlines. Limousines bring students from airport to campus. Greyhound and Trailways Bus Lines also serve Bristol.



# How to Apply for Admission

First, complete and return the application with your application fee. The date this is received in the Admissions Office establishes the order in which your residence hall assignment will be made.

After receiving the application, the Admissions Office will send forms for requesting your transcript of credits and references. For freshmen, there is also a form for optional self-inventory.

You may apply for either fall or spring semesters. Transfers are welcomed and full credit is given for work at accredited institutions. Grades are

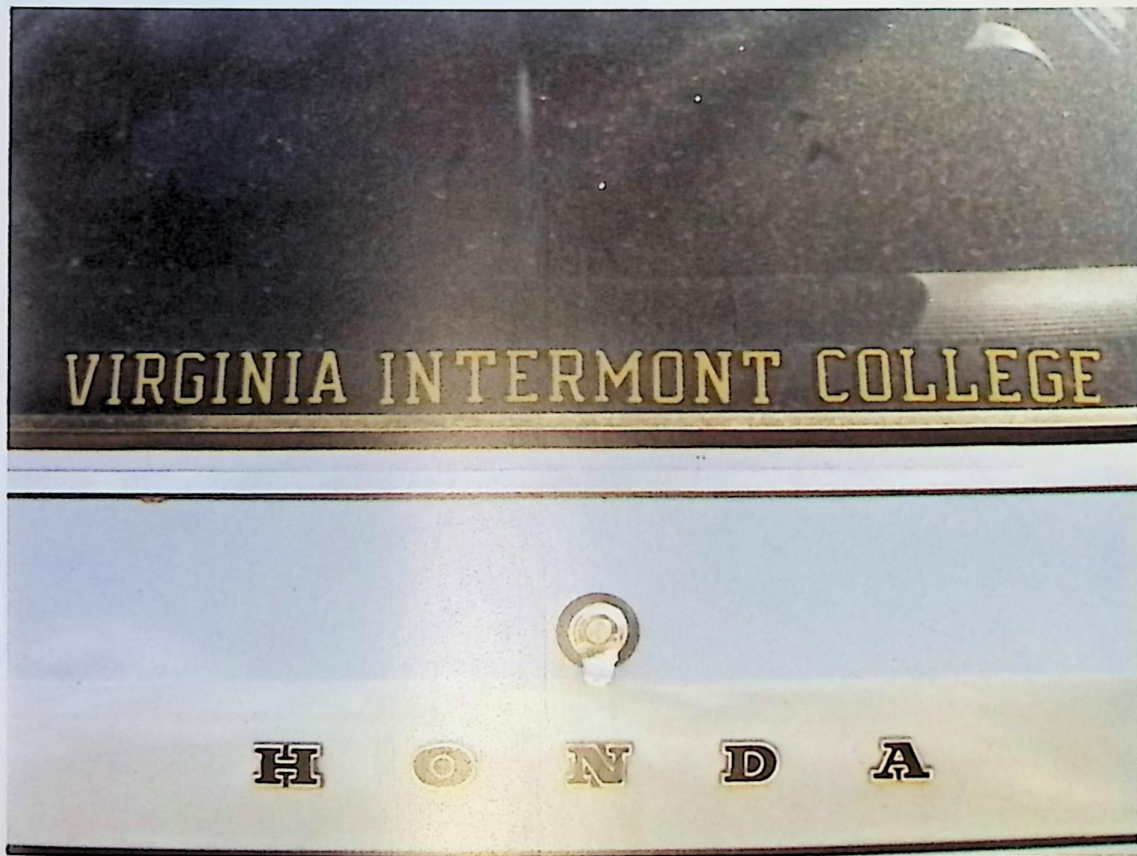
accepted at face value.

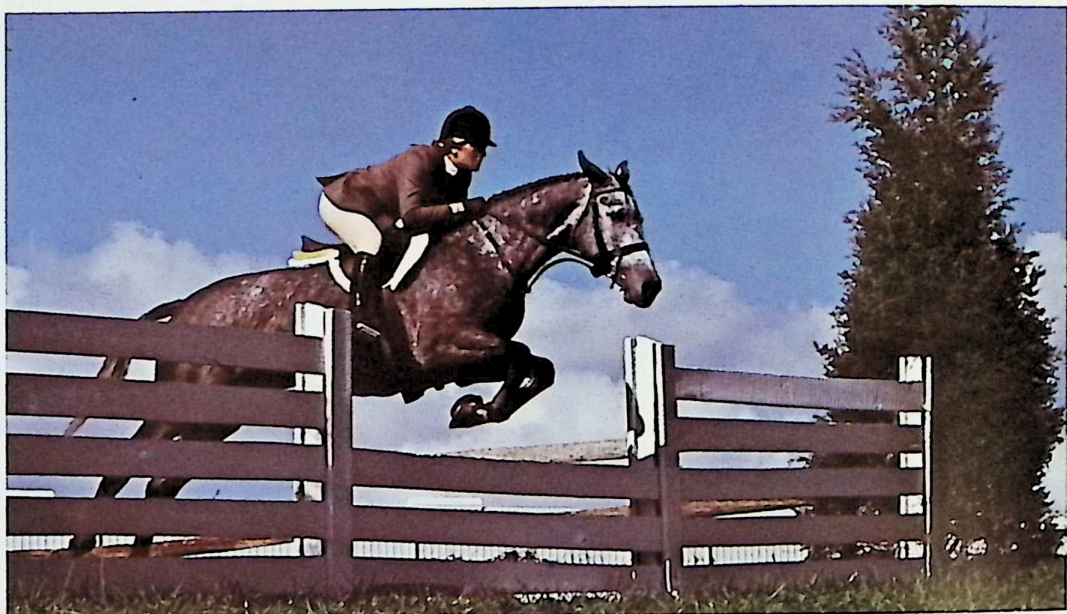
Most candidates present SAT scores, but ACT is acceptable. There is no cut-off point in test scores. Minimum academic requirement is graduation from high school with an average of C or better.

Qualified high school juniors may apply for early admission; if accepted, they may skip the senior year of high school and begin full-time college work.

You will have an answer from the Admissions Office shortly after your credentials are filed.

All applicants receive consideration for admission without regard to race, creed, color, sex, or national origin.
